MESSAGE FROM THE EDITOR: Alene Reaugh

Twenty years ago, four women of Cornish decent met on May 23, 1998, to set up an organization to remember and honor their ancestors and to help each other trace their genealogy back to Cornwall. Those women are remembered now twenty years later as our founders, they are Jean Timmermeister, Joan Tregarthen Huston, Marci Rothman and Betty Scott. The objectives of the society were:

- A) To provide communications regarding heritage/genealogical information pertaining to Cornwall, throughout the states of Washington, Oregon, and Idaho.
- B) To promote the preservation of public and private Cornish heritage/genealogical material.
- C) To cooperate with other organizations in the furtherance of mutual objectives.

Since that first meeting, we have grown each year with new people at each meeting. We now have a website and a Facebook page to keep up with what members are doing and to learn new things. We also get some great photographs.

For the past several years we started attending the Celtic Festivals & Games held throughout the Pacific Northwest. We set up the Cornish Booth and then as people walk by we ask them if they have Cornish roots. Most people advise they don't know or are not sure, so we help them determine if any of their ancestral names are Cornish. We help to educate and provide reading material. We also have a few Cornish things to sell.

This year we are scheduled for:

- 4) Hood Canal Highland Celtic Festival on September 1-2 in Belfair, WA (Joan Tregarthen Huston & Claudia Hunt & Annie Laurie Burke)

Several of our members have been to Cornwall, and each person has their own stories and pictures to share. Now as we embark on the next decade, we will continue to grow each year to increase our numbers and hear new family stories. Finally, three business Items:

- 1) In July of 2017, we misplaced 2 boxes of our library books, tapes and misc. We also misplaced our banner which was made by one of our members. If anyone has seen any of these items, please contact one of the board members.

- 3) At the July meeting, we will be voting on a change of by-laws. Because our group is spread out from British Columbia, Washington, Oregon, and Idaho, it is becoming increasing more difficult for members in the South to attend the meeting in the North (Puyallup) and for some in the North to attend the meeting in the South (Vancouver). Several things were discussed at the meeting. The most popular solution is to consider a change of the Board Elect a President and two Vice Presidents. (One for the North and one for the South). The Vice Presidents would confer with the President on the agenda and then the VP would conduct the meeting in the North and the other in the South. We will need an active discussion before voting to change the by-laws. So please come prepared to discuss this change. In addition, we will hold an election for the new Board.

Looking forward to seeing everyone together again at Ft. Borst Park, everyone is welcome, you need not be Cornish, just have a love of Cornwall or your Cornish friends. I am Anxious to see old friends and meet new people.

CRAIG AND COLLEEN - 2018 TRIP TO NEW ZEALAND

Our New Zealand trip started on February 20 with a nonstop flight from Vancouver, BC to Auckland and ended on March 20 with a return through Los Angeles. We flew with Air New Zealand.

After our arrival, we travelled with my brother, sister in law and her mother and were joined by their son, daughter in law and grandson for the last week. The first three days were spent with my cousin and other family members in Hamilton, which is on the North Island. We then flew to Christchurch on the South Island and spent two days there. We took a bus tour, via Mt. Cook, to Queenstown and a bus tour to, and a boat tour of, Milford Sound. One special event in Queenstown was a gondola trip to the top of Bob's Peak which about 1500 feet high. The view of Lake Wakatipu was great.

We used a rental van from March 2 to the 9th to tour parts of the South Island from south to north. This included stays in Invercargill (1nt), Dunedin (2nt), Haast (1nt), Greymouth (1nt) and Nelson(2nt). We stayed in houses, condos and hotels.

We returned to the North Island by ferry across Cook Strait and stayed in Wellington, the capital of New Zealand, for two nights. One special event was a cable car trip up to a nature preserve called Zealandia.

We travelled by train, an 8 hour trip back to Hamilton, on March 11th. The remainder of the trip was spent in and around Hamilton, or at a lake property that belongs to my cousin's daughter and husband. We visited the extensive Hamilton Gardens (cousin is President of the support organization) and the time at the lake included a boat trip and a visit with other relatives whom we had never met before. We departed Auckland on March 20. Virginia Graham, my cousin, is the person responsible for me learning about my Cornish roots. She started doing family research over 40 years ago which resulted in her discovering our ancestral connection. I will forever be grateful to her for causing my curiosity that she initiated in 1997. Prior to this visit in New Zealand, my wife and I have been in Cornwall several times. The main purpose of these trips has been to meet relatives and find places (including some houses) where great-grandparents, grandparents, and my dad were born, or lived.

Don Juan a Cornish Miner By Lupita Duarte Clark

John Davey Clark, my great grandfather, sacrificed his life to save his miners at La Quintera Mine located in La Aduana, municipality of Alamos, state of Sonora, México. His heroic deed would have become a faint memory of the past if all we knew about him was that he died on May 1,1902 and that he was born on May 2, 1850, in Cornwall. This information is engraved in marble stone on his grave in the grand cemetery of the city of Alamos preserved still today. A story in the collective memory of those who heard it from their parents: *don Jan fue un gran hombre,* don Juan was a great man. The memory of his life had become a vestige of oral history remembered by the aging few in the historical mining region of southern Sonora.

Don Juan had an honorable and essential story that must be told and remembered. As so many Cornish miners that migrated all over the world from Cornwall seeking a better opportunity he too came to northern California in the 1870s, became a naturalized citizen and mined in Placer County. In 1880 he moved on to Placerville, Colorado as many Cornish miners use to gravitate to the next productive mining region. My g grandfather travelled farther and settled in the Alamos region in 1881, in México. A bachelor then he found a beautiful wife, my g grandmother Dolores Ybarra. He never left, and they had five children, one was my grandfather Guillermo Clark, who was only two years old when his father died in 1902. Of course, we want to know where exactly in Cornwall did he come from and who was his family.

He came from western Cornwall from a tradition of miners that goes back centuries. His paternal grandparents, George Clark and Elizabeth William, came from and married in the Parish of Gwinear and the maternal grandparents John Davey and Elizabeth Rodda, came from the Crowan Parish District and were living in Leeds town in 1841. The Davey family was quite numerous, and you still find many in Cornwall and in Australia where many from the family migrated to. When my g grandfather was born in Cubert in 1850, his father William Clark was employed as a lead miner. He was the 5th child. As many miners in the mid-19th century, parents were migrating in search of mining employment opportunities, and by 1855 they were living in St. Austell where his two youngest sisters were born. Sadly, his father William passed away and his mother Mary Ann Davey returned to Crowan with seven children. One can imagine that supporting a large family would have been difficult for his mother and it not surprising then

that even my g grandfather was the age of ten he was working in a copper mine and his older siblings were also working as tin miners and bal maidens.

My journey to understand and learn who my g grandfather has taken me to appreciate him and to pursue the acknowledgment that he so well deserves in history. Years of of experience and a strong work ethic earned my g grandfather the title of Captain of La Quintera mine, and when he went down the mine to rescue his workers from the fire, it would be unforgiven not to honor his memory with his biography.

A folk song was written immediately after and the following verses attest to his noble spirit and moral fortitude:

> Don Juan Clark the miner sad and disconsolate said to his companions I will bring them all out

One by one he brought them up All in bad shape He was not able to come out Some people brought him up He was already dead.

In brief, this was my great grandfather John Davey Clark, Don Juan, a noble Cornish miner.

The importance of the Cornish Global Migration Program (CGMP) continues to grow. The growing number of visitors to the Program, both personally and via the mails, encourages the volunteers working with the program. The success of the program depends on the having the names of all migrants from Cornwall, whether to Britain or overseas recorded in the CGMP database.

The mission of the CGMP is to build a database of all emigrants regardless of how little information is available. The main interest comes from the family historian but the data also enables anyone who has a particular interest to establish certain statistics. The CGMP is a non profit organization working for the benefit of Cornwall.

To provide a comprehensive database, the CGMP is dependent on families recording their personal emigration information with the program. The database has about 38.000 names recorded from around the world.
