IN SEARCH OF A GOOD PASTY

When I was twelve years old, my Grandmother Lorraine Hosking made “Cornish pasties” for everyone in the family. She made enough so that we all had some to freeze and cook later. I didn’t know what a pasty was, but I knew how much I loved them. For years she would make them for the family about once a year.

One day in 2002, I thought about my grandma and recalled how much I loved her Cornish pasties. I didn’t know if I had her recipe, so I went to the internet to see if I could find one. I found Ann’s Pasty Shop at the Lizard in Cornwall, and they had an excellent book, “The Pasty,” which I just had to order. That was the beginning of a beautiful friendship with Hettie Merrick, the author, and her husband Joe, who lives in Gunwalloe, Helston, Cornwall. After about two years of letter writing and getting to know each other, she invited me to come for a visit. I met her daughter Ann (who makes the best Pasties in Cornwall) and the other family members. We have been there twice, and we plan to make another trip back as soon as we can arrange it.


After joining the Cornish American Heritage Society, Dick Colenso contacted me to tell me about the Pacific Northwest Cornish Society. I called my cousin Margaret Porter and told her about this group, and she agreed we should go to a meeting. On October 12, 2002, we went to the meeting of the Pacific Northwest Cornish Society in Olympia and became members. Over the past twenty years, we have made many friends through this group.

Dick Colenso became President in July 2003, and he asked me if I would establish the “Country Store” for the

website and sell Cornish items at meetings. The store has been very successful, with several members providing items for sale.

In 2005, Dick nominated me for a position on the Board, and I agreed to serve as a Vice President. When the meeting occurred in July for the election of officers, I was elected VP; however, no one came forward to be President, so I became acting President by default. The following year it was official, and I became President for the next four years (2006 thru 2010.) In 2012 I was elected as President for the next two years. In 2018, I was elected Secretary and Newspaper Editor. I have done the newsletter for four years, and I enjoyed doing that, but now the time has come for me to leave the group and let others take over as Newspaper Editor, Country Store, Secretary, and President.

My husband and I have plans to travel, which will take most of my time. I hope to come back sometime in the future, but for now, I will say Goodbye to all the wonderful people I met through the Cornish Society. It’s been a wild ride.

ANDREA WILD & PRESTON WILDE

PERFORMING CELTIC MUSIC



In October 2019, just before the mad pandemic took over our lives, Andrea's group played for us at the October meeting in Portland. We are happy to have them entertaining us again at our annual picnic at Ft. Borst Park in Centralia.

Andrea Wild & Preston Wilde are delighted to be performing for the NW Cornish Society. Preston is a piper and fiddler with a passion for Celtic music. They are fellow band members of Andrea Wild & The Bad Wolves. Together they will play a variety of Cornish songs as well as a few Welsh songs and tunes. Expect to see a family member or two joining them in the performance.

ANDREA WILD: She is a singer, producer and emcee from Liverpool, UK currently residing in Portland. Andrea created and manages the high energy Celtic band, The Stomptowners, the Welsh-driven Andrea Wild & The Bad Wolves and Three Pound Note.

Born in Liverpool, England, Andrea was raised with the sibling singing tradition emphasizing harmony and a cappella performance. Andrea and her brother, Straford grew up in a Welsh speaking household with an Irish uncle and a father who insisted they support Leeds United. They sang in folk clubs

throughout the North of England and Andrea was a regular at Liverpool's Irish Centre. Their love of traditional folk music and a quest for adventure took them from Penzance to the Isle of Skye learning new material and performing along the way. After moving to the United States, Andrea continued to sing with her brother, Straford. They performed at folk festivals and music venues throughout the US. Both Wild released a CD recording in 2002 *Just Say Nevoth*. Andrea pursued a variety of solo opportunities. She produced and hosted Irish, world folk and soul music programs on Portland's independent KBOO radio. Her native wit and clear articulation earned her a go-to position within the community for emceeing all manner of music, cultural, and fundraising events. Andrea joined PSU Chorale and earned a longed-for opportunity to perform at Carnegie Hall. She is a dedicated member of the Welsh Society of Oregon and also sings with Oregon's Welsh Dragon Choir.

PRESTON WILDE performs with Uilleann pipes, fiddle, and whistles Preston grew up in Northern California where he first heard Irish traditional music in the form of a Finbar Furey recording belonging to his father. This recording sparked Preston's deep interest in the uilleann pipes. After several years playing whistle, flute, and Scottish bagpipes as a child, Preston began learning the uilleann pipes at age 17 with the help of Dingle piper Con Durham as well as the Pub Scouts, the local Irish music collective in Chico, CA. Preston frequently plays at regional ceilis, workshops, sessions and concerts. He has performed with Ensemble Galilei, An Irish Christmas, Cake, Alistair Fraser, Kevin Burke and many others.

PLAN A

Article VI Duties of Officers

Section 1 The President is responsible for day-to-day oversight, the preparation of meeting agendas, and shall preside over all meetings of the Executive Board and annual general membership meetings. They shall act as ex-officio member of all committees, except the nominating committee. All contracts by and for the Society shall be signed by the President and approved by one other officer as noted in the corporation minutes.

Section 2 The Vice-President shall assist the President in administrative duties and perform the duties of the President in the absence or inability of that officer to serve. The Vice-President shall be responsible for selecting and developing the program including speakers/trainers/or others as necessary.

Section 3 The Secretary shall record and distribute to the membership the minutes of each meeting. They shall read the minutes of the previous meetings as requested and preserve all minutes and reports. In lieu of reading the minutes at each meeting, a copy of the minutes may be transmitted to members by mail or email to all members prior to the meeting where they will be considered. Minutes shall include verbatim all motions from the floor and results of those motions. The Secretary is responsible for ensuring the President's agenda includes all unfinished business or tabled motions until such time they are complete. A complete file of all records shall be passed on to each succeeding secretary. S

B. Newsletter Editor: to create and publish a quarterly newsletter that includes information of interest to Society members.

C. Library: to hold, inventory, and make available contents of the library of the Society.

D. Cornish Store: to hold, inventory, replenish, available for sale items of Cornish interest.
